Saint Frances Cabrini (1850–1917)

Frances Cabrini was the first U.S. citizen to be canonized a saint. In Italy, she founded the Missionaries of the Sacred Heart to care for poor children. As a U.S. citizen, she worked in New York with Italian immigrants.

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Scripture Background

Before the Time of Jesus

Anointing with Oil Since ancient times, Jews have used oil to anoint people and sacred objects. God instructed Moses to anoint the Ark of the Covenant, the sacred chest that held the Ten Commandments. The prophet Samuel anointed David as king by pouring oil over his head. David became God's representative, chosen to rule the people with justice. Following our Jewish heritage, Catholics use oil for anointing and blessing in many of the sacraments.

OUR CATHOLIC TRADITION in Liturgy

Easter Vigil In the early days of the Church, new members were welcomed into the community of believers during the Easter Vigil service. During this initiation ceremony, new Catholics were baptized, confirmed, and received First Eucharist. In recent years, the Church has restored the initiation tradition and now each year many people enter the Church through the Rite of Christian Initiation (RCIA).
