## Scripture Background

#### In the Time of Jesus

**Birds** Because of its varied climates and types of environments, the Holy Land attracts many species of birds. The Bible refers to fifty different species. Over forty books in the Bible mention birds, such as eagles, owls, storks, quails, hens, and sparrows. In Jesus' time, all small birds were called sparrows. Jesus spoke of his Father's concern for all of creation, even small birds. Both Matthew and Luke refer to sparrows in their gospels.

## OUR CATHOLIC TRADITION in Art

**Illumination** The painstaking work of monks and artists of the Middle Ages has left us with some priceless treasures of Scriptures copied and illuminated by hand. *Illumination* is a kind of decoration that was often used to illustrate and highlight the first letter of a passage. Artists used bright colors and gold to intertwine pictures of flowers and animals in the letter, making it so fancy that it was sometimes difficult to figure out what letter it was supposed to be. But the artworks are extraordinarily detailed and beautiful. They show the reverence in which the artists held the Holy Scriptures.
