Scripture Background

Before the Time of Jesus

Loans In biblical times, it was considered a good deed to lend to people in need. To secure a loan, the borrower had to pledge something such as his land or animals. Sometimes a borrower might even pledge a family member. If the loan was not repaid, the promised relative became a slave to the lender. Every seventh year, all debts were cancelled and these slaves were freed.

In Matthew 18:21–35, Jesus teaches forgiveness through the parable of the king who cancels the debt of his servant.
