Before the Time of Jesus

Biblical Mountains In the Bible, mountains have spiritual significance. In the Old Testament, God made a covenant with the Israelites on Mt. Sinai. Abraham went to Mt. Moriah to sacrifice his son (Genesis 22:2). Mt. Moriah (later called Mt. Zion) is also the site of Solomon's temple (2 Chronicles 3:1). Mountains are also significant in the New Testament, most notably in the Sermon on the Mount (Matthew 5–7). Jesus' Transfiguration took place atop a mountain (Matthew 17:1–8), and the Mount of Olives is the site of many important events in Jesus' life, including the Agony in the Garden (Matthew 26:36–46) and the Ascension (Acts 1:6–12).

OUR CATHOLIC TRADITION in Art

The Holy Land In 1997, the dome of the Church of the Holy Sepulchre in Jerusalem was unveiled following an extensive renovation. Many Christians believe that the Church of the Holy Sepulchre was built on the exact site of Jesus' crucifixion.

The painting on the dome represents the glory of God enveloping the Risen Christ. Twelve golden rays represent the Twelve Apostles. Each ray has three streams of light, symbolizing the Father, Son, and Holy Spirit. The background color of mother-of-pearl represents the luminous cloud that often accompanies the presence of God in Scripture.
